

# WE ARE ALL WITNESSES – PEOPLE IN A CHANGING CLIMATE

Experiences of people from Europe, Amazonia, West Africa and South Asia



These **30 panels** make use of personal testimonies and the depiction of natural phenomena to illustrate the experiences of people from Europe, Amazonia, West Africa and South Asia. In them, people from around the world report on their current and future challenges and appeal to the responsibility of each individual. They show how climate change is already taking place in 16 countries on 4 continents.

# THE LAND WE GRAB SEIZING TROPICAL RAINFOREST AND SOIL


Eyewitnesses from the Amazon and Africa... and how Europe is involved

We Europeans use much more land for our consumption of food and raw materials than we have available in Europe itself. This exhibition shows examples from the Amazon and Africa of what the consequences are for the people living there, while shedding light on various aspects of the global dimension to our consumption. Special attention is paid to land grabbing - the recent aggressive form of seizing land - without forgetting, however, that we are, with our lifestyle choices, propelling this scramble for land... and that we can also slow it down again. The **24 panels** show examples from Brazil, Bolivia, Cameroon and Romania. Besides these countries, the exhibition offers further background information on the topic of land grabbing.



# OUR HOLD OVER THE WORLD'S RAW MATERIALS

Facts and eyewitness reports from the Congo, Peru, Ecuador, Nigeria and the Arctic on the downsides of our consumption



We now know that our level of consumption is not sustainable or transferable to the rest of the world. We simply consume too much of the world's resources and pollute the environment too much. For example, in 2008, Europeans used over 40 kg of material per person per day; an Asian only used 24 kg and an African less than 15 kg.

In this exhibition (**23 panels**), we look more closely at the indirect material flows associated to imports and their effects on the exporting countries. This is understood to mean the total amount of substances that are moved in the country of origin in order to obtain the raw materials that we import - for example, the entire overburden of mines.
